Ready Jet Go!

Saturdays at 10:30am, begins July 2

This new series from the creators of the animated hit series Dinosaur Train is based on another sure-fire winner with kids - space! Ready Jet Go! is about three kids who befriend the new boy on their street, who just happens to be an alien. Together the friends embark on planetary adventures, exploring the solar system and learning about space, astronomy and technology. The series aims to get kids engaged in science and show them the importance of collaboration, teamwork, perseverance and "reaching for the stars." One of the main themes of the show is that science is constantly changing as people learn new things. An astrophysicist from the NASA Jet Propulsion Laboratory, Dr. Amy Mainzer, provided content expertise and appears in short segments featuring real-life experiments. The series was animated in Vancouver - hence the familiar setting of trees and mountains for scenes on Earth - and features upbeat original songs that reinforce learning.

Ginalina's Music Club

Kids and adults alike will find themselves tapping their toes and humming along to these delightful new music videos from Vancouver children's musician Ginalina (also known as Gina Lam). The folk-based songs, from her Juno-nominated album *Forest Friends' Nature Club*, explore the wonders and enchantment of the natural world. We talked to Ginalina about her music and the videos, produced and directed by Kat and Cam Hayduk from Turtlebox Productions on Bowen Island. The singer/songwriter, who has four young children of her own, is excited and honoured to have her music featured on Knowledge Kids.

How would you describe your music?

I'd describe it in three words: my music is honest, my music is playful, and my music is reflective.

Where do you find inspiration?

I'm a pretty simple person – or maybe I'm a stubborn person, I don't know. It doesn't take much for me to find beauty in ordinary things. The other side of that coin is that I can be really determined to find the interesting stuff in the mundane.



How does your music reflect your own life?

I've always been a singer/songwriter. I write about things that are happening in my life, the things that I've seen, that I think, that I feel. Being a busy mom, it's just natural to write songs that are inspired by the stories that we live out together. It's not uncommon that we'll be doing an activity like baking bread and suddenly I'll stop and sing something like "Bread, make it with jam, bread!" And then a song kind of grows from there.

How did you come up with the songs in the videos?

I was homeschooling my eldest daughter and we wanted to do some nature appreciation and exploration. So I got everybody boots, and my children and I made a family pact to go to Vancouver's Pacific Spirit Park every week on a Wednesday, rain or shine. It was great because during our time there the songs came very naturally, very organically, from the things we were doing and seeing.

Your kids performed on the album; are they also in the videos?

In "Honey, We Love You" their faces have little cameos on buzzing bees. It's quite funny!
